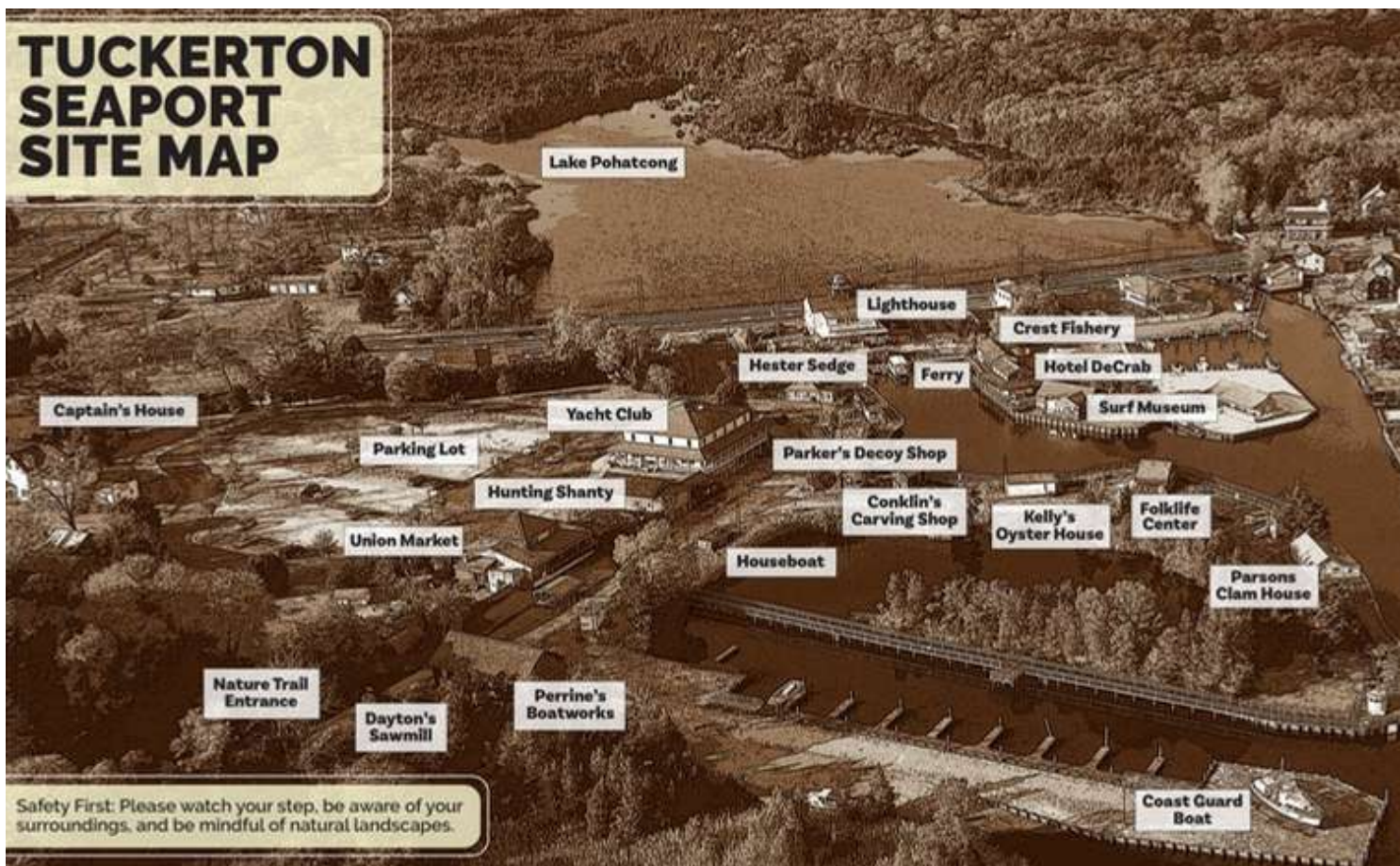

2026 Bird of the Year

Northern Pintail

The Northern Pintail is a gorgeous duck, prized for its striking colors and pleasant taste. The drake has a chestnut neck and head and a blue bill with a central black streak. It has a bright white streak from the breast up the neck sides, creating a scoop-neck collar appearance. In the right light you may even get a glimpse of the rosy wash where the white streak meets the brown of the back of the head. Pintails are named for their long central tail feathers giving the bird an elongated appearance. Their sides are patterned with light and dark gray vermiculation, a pattern of dense lines with irregular patterns.

The hen pintail is a very finely patterned bird with more delicate features. Many shades of browns and tans mark her slender frame. Although the tail feathers of the hens are not as long as those of the drake, they still are longer than most other North American dabbling duck species. Both the drake and hen have a green speculum with a border of white and tan on their secondary feathers usually only seen in their full brilliance when in flight.

Northern Pintails, also commonly called sprigs or sprig-tails, can be found in shallow coastal and inland waters in New Jersey. They feed primarily on seeds, aquatic vegetation, and invertebrates. On their breeding grounds, they are one of the earliest waterfowl to nest. The female nests away from the water's edge and within one day of the ducklings hatching they walk to the nearest body of water to feed and grow.

As with most of our migratory dabbling ducks in New Jersey, they nest in the wetlands of the prairie pothole region of North America. This geographic region, including much of the Dakotas, Montana, Nebraska, Minnesota, and Canada, was created over tens of thousands of years from glacial activity. As the massive glaciers moved south they scoured shallow scars across the land. As the ice sheets retreated and the scars filled with water, the prairie potholes were born. Needless to say, it took a while for this ecosystem to form.



The glaciers also brought something else into that area, nutrients in the form of crushed rock and displaced soil. This led to the prairie pothole region becoming a hub of agriculture in North America. This has become the largest threat to the Northern Pintail populations. The draining and filling of the potholes for better agricultural conditions has led to many thousands of acres of wetlands being lost. In the 1950's, the population was estimated at 9 million, decreasing in the 70's to an estimated 6 Million. That number was cut in half over the next three decades, and has slowly been recovering since. With a stable current population estimate of 3.3 million, this duck is not considered imperiled but actions must be taken if we are to maintain the population at a healthy number.

Thankfully, since 1958 the federal government has been purchasing, protecting, and restoring wetlands in the prairie pothole region with funds raised through the sale of federal duck stamps. The lands purchased through this program are known as Waterfowl Production Areas. Through this federal program over 668,000 acres of prairie wetlands have been purchased and protected. Although that acreage only makes up 2% of the whole region, these Waterfowl Production Areas produce 23% of the waterfowl there. Just imagine how many more ducks we could have if more of these potholes were protected and restored.

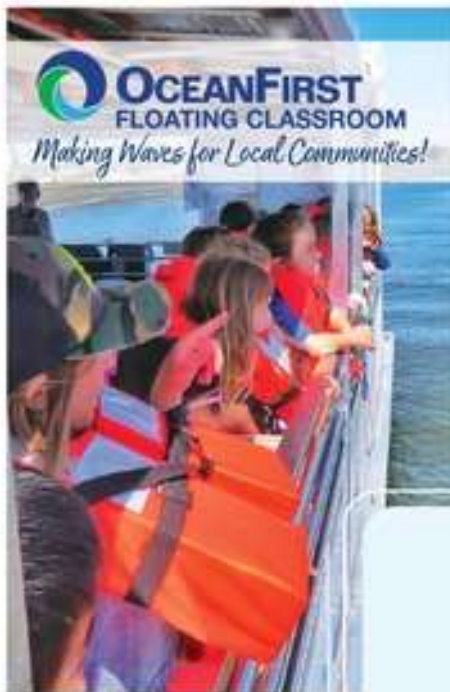

HURLEY CONKLIN AWARD

Harry V. Shourds (1861-1920)

2026 Heritage Awardee

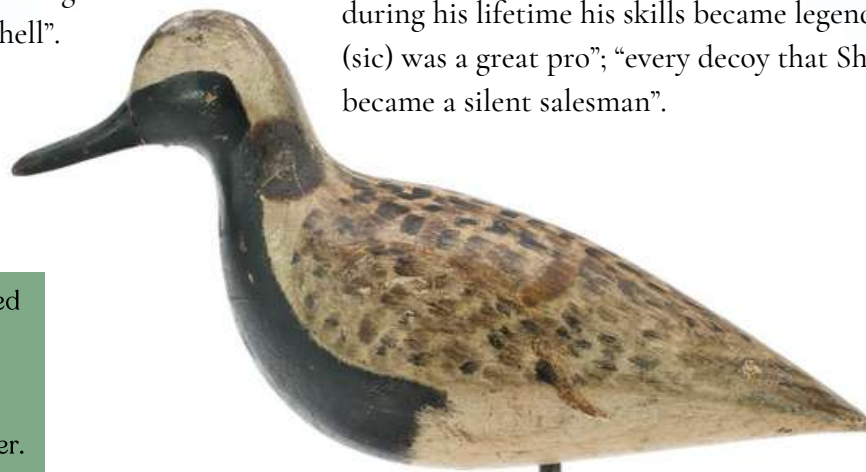
How appropriate that this 2026 Heritage Award be presented to a Shourds during the 250th anniversary of our country's Revolution. During the Revolution, there were approximately 12 Shourds men residing in Tuckerton, among them one Joseph Shourds, a 4th generation Grandfather of honoree Harry Vinuckson Shourds. This Joseph Shourds married Keziah Andrews in 1759 – Miss Andrews was the daughter of Edward Andrews, the man who drove the beavers from Tuckerton Creek and built a dam for his gristmill; today we are presenting this Heritage Award on the shore of that very lake that Harry V. Shourds' 4X maternal grandfather built. As for the Revolution, it is unlikely that any Shourds man fought either as a patriot or a tory – they were Quakers without exception.

How appropriate that this second annual heritage award is awarded to the father of the first heritage awardee! Both son and father were house painters and carpenters respectively. While father Harry passed his heritage (making classic Barnegat Bay decoys) to son Harry M., both are arguably the most recognized decoy makers of all New Jersey generations. Additionally, other family decoy makers that followed both (brother John Shourds, grandsons Alvin Shourds, great-grandsons Ross Shourds and Malcolm Robinson) owe their recognition and abilities to "Nucky" and "Mitchell".

How appropriate that despite no mention of Shourds in the first and classic 1935 book of decoy collecting, Joel Barber's "Wild-Fowl Decoys", William Mackey's seminal 1975 book "American Bird Decoys" recognizes Harry V. Shourds and devotes practically an entire chapter describing him as "the greatest professional decoy maker of New Jersey." Never mind that Mr. Mackey misspells Shourds as Shourdes or Shores throughout. Says Mackey: "Even during his lifetime his skills became legend" and "Shourdes (sic) was a great pro"; "every decoy that Shourdes made became a silent salesman".

How appropriate that Shourds decoys are prized by collectors throughout the United States and the auction houses offering Shourds decoys often “hammer” those birds for six figures, a far cry from Harry’s six dollars a dozen charged at the beginning of the 20th century. Again, to quote from “American Bird Decoys” - “His kind will never appear along the tidewaters of the Atlantic coast and all of us are poorer without him.”

This Heritage award was designed to recognize the legacy of those who would have qualified as a Hurley Conklin finalist had they lived to be so honored. Harry V. Shourds and Harry Mitchell Shourds are a redefinition of all past awards living or otherwise *how appropriate* for the show committee to recognize the greatness embodied in the legacy of these two men.

The Late Great Hurley Conklin (1913–1991)

2026 Heritage Awardee

One of the most remarkable characters I've ever met was my friend and mentor, Hurley Conklin. Hurley was one of the last professional decoy makers in the true sense of the word. He carved South Jersey hollow cedar gunning decoys by the dozen beginning sometime after his return from service in WWII. Hurley's decoys with their sleek profiles and stylized paint patterns always stand out in a crowd, despite the lack of much detailed carving. His originality and carving skill is evident in his work, beginning with his early unbranded gunning stools which evolved into his exquisite "shelf ducks" from the 1970s and 80s.

Unfortunately, despite all the time I spent with Hurley, I never asked him much about his early carving days. I know that historian and decoy collector Grove Conrad has stated that a carver named Frank Lamson influenced the young Hurley in his decoy-making efforts. Both men lived in the village of Mayetta, (as did other Lamson and Conklin families). When comparing Conklin decoys with those attributed to Lamson, there is no doubt as to that connection. That being said, I see the influence of my all-time favorite carver, Nathan Rowley Horner in Hurley's work. I've often said, "Hurley took up where Rowley left off." While Horner was from Tuckerton, he lived all over Ocean County as an adult; Dover, Long Beach Island, and lastly West Creek (Eagleswood). Hurley grew up in Mayetta just up Rt 9 a few miles. Horner died at around 60 years of age in 1942, and Hurley came home from the War in 1944. If Hurley didn't know him, he surely saw plenty of Rowley's decoys.

As with most "professional" decoy makers, Hurley's style changed over the years. His work can be described

as early (made for gunning only), transitional, and his later refined "shelf ducks" as he liked to call them. In fact, Hurley Conklin was one of the few contemporary carvers who developed their own recognizable style (as did Bob White, George Strunk and Pete Peterson to name a few). The work of Conklin and the others mentioned can be described as a "school": an original style that influenced the work of other carvers in their region.

Years ago, a fellow collector referred to Conklin decoys as "cartoonish", which I believe can be considered a compliment. For centuries, political cartoonists have exaggerated certain characteristics of their subjects making a character easily identifiable without the use of text. Hurley did the same when designing and carving a decoy. His early decoys can be described as handsome, functional working stools, where his later work, especially his "shelf ducks" can be described as sleek and racy. Over a half a century of carving, Hurley carved most duck and goose and shorebird species found in

South Jersey. During the latter part of his career, he seemed to like carving Red Breasted Mergansers, Hooded Mergansers, Green-winged Teal, Black Ducks, and Brant, as they made up a lot of his production. Gadwalls and Wood Ducks and maybe Mallards by Conklin are especially rare, and not so much, Buffleheads, Blue-winged Teal, and Common Mergansers.

Hurley grew up in the Mayetta/Cedar Run area of Stafford Township, just below Manahawkin. He was one of the eight children of Charles W. Conklin and Kathryn (Katie) Hyde Conklin. Not long after meeting Hurley I asked him what nationality he was and he replied, "I think we're Irish." I wish I knew then what I know now; I'd long suspected that the Ocean County Conklins were descended from the "Conklings" of eastern Long Island, New York.

A couple of hours of research for this bio revealed that the Conklins, or the "Conklings" as the earliest ones spelled it, were in Stafford Township well before the American Revolution. Not long after arriving in Stafford, the folks by the name of Conklin dropped the "G" at the end of their name. It turns out that Hurley, like his great-grandfather Amariah Conklin (born New Jersey 1809), was a descendant of Annanias Conkling who left County Staffordshire, England and landed in Salem, Massachusetts by 1639. That first Conklin in America, along with the Birdsalls, Hands, and Hildreths, was one of the earliest settlers in the whaling village of East Hampton, Long Island (where he died in 1657). The fact that Stafford Township is named for the home county of the earliest Conklin immigrant is one hell of a coincidence.

Hurley might have gotten a kick out of knowing that his ancestors back on Long Island in the 1600s were likely killing ducks (and whales) with the relatives of

Artie Birdsall and myself and probably quite a few other members of the New Jersey Decoy Collectors Association.

By the way, the 1850 Federal Census shows that Hurley's great-grandfather Amariah Conklin couldn't leave his Stafford farm without bumping into a Cranmer, a "Spragg", or a Lamson. The Census records list Hurley, his father Charles, and his grandfather Peter Conklin as "bayman". Commercial clamming seems to be the most common occupation for generations of the Conklin family and their neighbors.

Hurley left school after the 6th grade and the 1930 Census lists him as a 17-year-old "Bayman" working in the "seafood industry" with his older brothers, Amos 23, and Alvin 21. He may have started carving decoys a little at this time (I wish I had asked him more about that). Hurley continued to work as a clammer until WWII, during which he served in the U. S. Army for 3 1/2 years in North Africa and France (1941-1944). After the war, Hurley married a girl from up the road in Berkeley Township (Mary E. Johnson). They built a house on Parker Street in Manahawkin where they raised their daughter while Hurley made a living at various pursuits; making decoys, carpentry work, and guiding for the Marsh Elder Gun Club.

Below are some anecdotes of things I know of or that Hurley shared with me. As a carver myself, I've always credited Hurley and Harry Shourds III as being my mentors. The difference between the two; Harry let me watch him, while Hurley took me under his wing.



Hurley told me that one winter (1950s-1960s) he made 95 of his "paddle tail" Canada Geese; that is, chopped, spoke shaved, hollowed & sanded all by hand!

He was a true “bayman”, did a little of this, a little of that. One time a man with a heavy German accent came to see him and said he wanted a “cesspool duck”, Hurley replied, “Well, I make black ducks, brant and sheldrakes, but I don’t make any cesspool ducks.” ...It turned out the man wanted a cesspool *dug*.

Decoy dealer, Zeke Zasz of Barnegat (by way of Elizabeth, North Jersey), once told me that he quit buying ducks from Hurley when he raised his price from \$19 to \$21; Hurley told me he ended their working relationship when Zeke tried to pay him for some decoys with a check written out in pencil!

According to Mike Mangum, Hurley set up at table at the first Old Time Barnegat Bay Decoy & Gunning Show. As far as I know, Hurley only regularly exhibited at one decoy show, the “Quail Hill Inn” show, which was put on by Fred and Ethel Noyes. He only did that show because it was free, and a seafood buffet was served to the exhibitors after the show.

Hurley didn’t put up a fancy display, just a bare table with ducks lined up like cars at an auto dealer. Most of Hurley’s decoys were pre-sold anyway.

Hurley held about the same view regarding decorative carvers as I did back then. One time as exhibitors were setting up at the Quail Hill show, Hurley turned to me and nodded in the direction of someone carrying an armful of burnt-feather ducks with more ribbons than a mummer in a Philly string band and said, “see him carrying all the **** in here, he’ll be carrying it out at the end of the day”. Hurley wasn’t arrogant, but he knew he was good! Hurley loved his little poodle, Pebbles. I don’t remember if it was Pebbles or an earlier dog but

Hurley told me the dog only ever bit one person, decoy collector Russell Holst (Russell had been forewarned not to pet the dog). My wife’s grandfather, John McCann, owned “the shack” and 400 acres on the Wading River and gunned with a dozen of Hurley’s teal. Russell Holtz’s parents were close family friends and after John McCann died, Russell took all but one of the teal off the widow’s hands.

Many veterans don’t like to share their wartime experiences, or in many cases not until their later years. Hurley was different, serving in the U.S. Army in Africa and France in WWII may have been traumatic, but it was the biggest event in his life. He shared with me (and many of you) lots of stories about foxholes in the North African desert and later his time in France spent driving an officer around in a jeep.

Hurley was proud of his work as a decoy maker and wasn’t easily impressed with stool by other carvers. I personally watched him take nondescript “clunkers” and re-carve the original heads to make them prettier; today those birds would appear to have been re-headed by Hurley.

The father and son duck hunting team of Dirk Van Nest and Peter Van Nest gunned over more Conklins than anyone I’ve ever met. Pete told me that they had about 60 of Hurley’s broadbills, 36 brant, a small rig of buffleheads and some black ducks. They also had the only rig of Conklin canvasbacks I’ve ever seen. Interestingly, Dirk bought some of the birds unpainted to save money and painted them himself. Years later he took those ones back to Hurley and had him paint them. Some would call those repaints, but in my opinion, they are original; Dirk primed them and

Hurley gave them the finish coat, just many years later! I have a pair of those buffleheads, two of my favorites, with the initials V N for “Van Nest” carved under the bills. One time while I was visiting Hurley, he expressed his admiration for carver Gene Hendrickson. I don’t know the connection between them or how Hurley knew him, but Hurley obviously thought a lot of him.

By the time I met Hurley, he had given up gunning for ducks. He told me in his low, slow voice, “I’ve killed enough ducks, I don’t need to kill anymore.” As I approached my 60s, I started to feel the same way. While he didn’t gun anymore, most every day Hurley would leave his house in Manahawkin and drive down to Cedar Run Landing “to see what was there”. I was lucky enough to share that experience with him on quite a few occasions.

Jim & Joan Seibert

2026 Heritage Awardee & Conklin Awardee

Trees and flowering shrubs almost hide the home that Jim and Joan Seibert built in Dennisville, New Jersey. Forty acres surround the rustic house; twenty of them are salt marsh, a selling point for her husband, said Joan, since he was an avid duck hunter.

The couple spent fifty years together carving decorative birds and producing hunting decoys for the sportsmen market. Sadly, Jim passed away in 2012. Since then, Joan did not feel she could take the Conklin Award without Jim being honored as well. Both deserving of the honor, the Decoy Show Committee selected Joan Seibert for the Conklin Award and Jim Seibert with the new, posthumous Harry M. Shourds Heritage Award.

“We were one entity - always identified as Jim and Joan Seibert at the shows. We always worked together,” said Joan.

Jim and Joan met while attending college. “We were the first art majors graduating from Glassboro—(now Rowan University.)” The couple taught art education in public schools. Joan and Jim taught for 11 years before they decided to start their decoy business and move back to where Jim grew up.

“When we lived in North Jersey we had some friends who invited us to go to Long Island to our first decoy show and Jim met Al McCormick –he was called ‘Mr. Decoy’.

He would teach guys to make cork decoys. So they would be down in the basement rasping cork decoys and it created static electricity and he'd be covered in dark brown cork. But that's how he started. This was in 1970.”

Jim carved mainly Delaware and Barnegat style decoys. While Jim carved full sized birds, Joan carved miniatures. “This is how I started carving miniatures: he had blocks of wood—he cut out the pattern and what was leftover were the corners. That's why I do that size. Honest to God that's how I started.”

The couple bought the Delaware Decoy Company from decoy carver Terry McNulty and worked it for 15 years. The machine-made decoys were rough carved on a type of router from a set pattern and could turn out 12 at a time. From there, the Seiberts did fine carving, sanding, and painting to finish the birds. “We really turned out a lot of birds. And we invented the jingle birds—(a decorative song bird with a bell attached). “We made and sold a lot of them.”

The Delaware Decoy Company sold wholesale to hunters. “We had a huge machine in the barn. We would

be up to our knees in sawdust. I did all the sanding and he did all the carving. At first we did all the painting but then we had to hire people to help."

Besides the hunting decoys, the couple worked on their own designs. "We never worked together on a bird but we advised each other," said Joan. "Jim was great with color. We worked together every day, daytime in the barn and nighttime decorative carving. We had a life!"

Because of his art background, Jim was very creative, said Joan. He made a model carousel with birds instead of horses. He made Noah's Arks with Joan's miniatures on the deck. His showstoppers included a life-size flying osprey and a diorama of a German shorthair puppy flushing three quail. "He made a lot of woodcock –hunters loved woodcocks –you can always sell a woodcock," said Joan.

"We used basswood for decorative birds –it's soft and the grain doesn't get in the way. Basswood is good for burning details like feathers. For working decoys we used cedar or pine."

The Seiberts started the Wings and Water Festival in Stone Harbor that ran for 30 years and was held the weekend before the Old Time Barnegat Bay Decoy and Gunning show in Tuckerton. They also started the Cape May show on the Boardwalk that is no longer. Both served as contest judges at shows. For ten years Jim was the resident decoy carver at Wheaton Village.

The life of a decoy carver means meeting lots of other decoy carvers and collectors at shows and the couple had many lifelong friends.

"We were very friendly with Hurley (Conklin) and Harry V. Shourds. Hurley was a regular guy but what I remember most is he had twinkling eyes. Everyone in the county carves with Jamie Hand—he, Tony Hillman, and myself are the last 'men' standing."

When Jim got sick, the couple sold the Jingle Bird franchise to the Bird House in Cape May and sold the Delaware Decoy Company to 'a couple of guys' in Nebraska.

They also sold their extensive collection of decoys to pay hospital bills. Joan is 84 and after her husband died she stopped carving and doing shows. Then a year ago, a collector of Joan's work, Jim Hudgins, a retiree from Fish and Wildlife Service, persuaded her to pick up her tools again. At 84, she is carving and painting again and enjoying it.

Looking back, "I think I had a wonderful life!" she said.

Anthony Hillman

2026 Hurley Conklin Awardee

As an outdoorsman, a painter, decoy carver, and author, Anthony “Tony” Hillman is a perfect candidate for the Conklin Award and as the artist of this year’s show print.

Born in Atlantic City in 1948 and raised in North Wildwood, he remembers a different, quieter shore than today. “I could go outside and play and I wandered all over. The beach and the marsh were my playgrounds. I spent a lot

of time fishing and crabbing at Tony’s Marina and the owners would feed me lunch. On the road to the marina there was an osprey nest on every pole.”

His father was a WWII veteran and worked as a TV repairman and his mom was a housewife who knew how to cook the ducks his brothers would bring home. His father also worked occasionally with famous decoy carver Harry Mitchell Shourds painting houses.

He had four brothers and was the next to the youngest in the pecking order. When his two older brothers hunted, it was Tony’s job to skin the birds. “I took a correspondence course in taxidermy but it didn’t take.”

Looking back into his extensive genealogy, Hillman recounted there is a Lt. Col. Josiah Hillman who fought in the Revolutionary War with George Washington and had oversight of a fort on the Delaware. There was also a John Hillman who was a house painter and carver in the 1700s. “Maybe the carving genes came from him,” Hillman speculated.

“I always drew birds. As a kid I drew on the end papers of the Book of Knowledge (Encyclopedia).”

When Hillman graduated from High School in 1966 he went to the Hussian School of Art in Philadelphia for six months. The war in Vietnam was heating up and he joined the Marines before being drafted. He was enrolled in the anti-tank division at Camp Lejeune in North Carolina. He thought he might be sent to Vietnam but he wound up going to sea school. He was on a destroyer that held 40 marines and 1,200 sailors. “We were in the Mediterranean and I was always looking at the birds that would alight on the rigging during their migration. I was on the ship a year and a day.”

Back at Camp Lejeune he drew military weapons from manuals for slides used for training purposes. It was his first experience with commercial art skills.

After his service he returned to Philly, married, and had a daughter. He got jobs with prestigious commercial and advertising firms but he missed the shore. “I was getting an ulcer and I hated living in the city.” So he took his bride and daughter to a small house on the bay in Brigantine. “My brother said I should go clamming. Well, we had a dock and there was an old garvey in the

yard half full of water and I bailed it out and started scratch raking hard clams. I averaged 800 to 1,200 clams on a tide. I'd take them to Pleasantville and sell them. I loved clamming, the birds would follow you around as you stirred up the mud." He also hunted and made his own decoys. His young daughter helped him paint snow geese flatties.

All through his life he kept on painting and drawing—watercolors of marsh scenes and ducks. He went to Stockton University and got a degree in painting. He still had connections in Philadelphia and did illustrations for Gray and Rodgers Advertising Agency, spot illustrations for the Fish and Wildlife Service and other clients. When his family moved to Seaville, he met Harry V. Shourds and they traveled to decoy shows together. Since Hillman knew commercial art he decided to do a shorebird pattern book with Shourds. "We did full size profiles and top views, we ring-bound it and printed 500 copies." "Harry and I did three books together and I later did the (decoy) painting books. I've published seven or eight books and sold over 100,000 copies." The books made his name in decoys. "You can't buy better advertising," he said.

His own style of decoy carving is self-taught by watching others carve.

"I used to visit Hurley Conklin. From him I learned to stretch the bodies out for more visibility. Hurley had talent to take a pattern and reduce it to its essentials."

"I was friends with Sam Hunt. I made him a couple of nice black ducks. Sam built me a sneakbox. He taught me a lot about wood."

Because of his friendship with Hunt, Hillman was invited to attend the 1983 Smithsonian Festival of American Folklife in Washington D.C.

"They said Sammy wouldn't go without me," said Hillman. "The Smithsonian sent a big truck to Sam's house in Waretown and took an 18-foot garvey and a 12-foot sneakbox. Sam threw a bunch of shoes in a gunnysack and we went to the festival."

The festival that year was highlighting New Jersey folk artists and French/American music and dance.

"It was two weeks in the summer and we had a great time. We were in a tent next to a bunch of Cajun musicians. Not everyone knows that Sam was a terrific dancer. He danced all day with Alice Ridgeway.

"Our tent was all decoys. Arthur Pelligrin was in his 80s. He carved in tupolo wood. Charlie Hankins and his helper set up a steam box and built a sea skiff.

"I had some black ducks that I sold and I met people from all over the world. A guy from Germany ordered a bird from me."

Hillman is known not only for his decoys and his books but for his miniatures. Ever the salesman, he notes that, "Everybody has room for miniatures."

He was chosen this year to paint the cover illustration for the Old Time Barnegat Bay Decoy and Gunning Show, a real honor.

His pattern and painting books of ducks, shorebirds, fish decoys and miniatures have inspired countless craftsmen and hobbyists and are still found on eBay and other outlets. And although he still carves for clients, "I'm as busy as I want to be, I had lots of work pressure when I was doing commercial art and I never said no but when it comes to decoys, I don't want to be rushed."

Herb Heinrichs

2026 Conklin Awardee

Decoy carver and artist Herb Heinrichs is part of a large family in Tuckerton that has included many talented tradesmen. His uncle was boat builder Gus Heinrichs. His Great Uncle was Captain Edward “Sock” Heinrichs, the owner of the Heinrichs boat shop and marine railway on Tuckerton Creek (current site of the Tuckerton Seaport). His grandmother Elsie had a dairy farm on Wood Street in Tuckerton and his grandfather Ed ran the tugboat and truck for the Fish Factory on Crab Island off Brigantine Road (also known as Great Bay Boulevard or Seven Bridges Road). His father was one of eight children: five sisters, Berta, Peggy, Reds (Elsie), Sis and Judy and two brothers, Alvie and Russell. His Dad was also Herb and was a builder. Herb Jr. grew up on Wood Street with sister Diane and brother Mark.

Tuckerton was very different then—it was a town that was 50 years behind the times. Hunting was a regular pastime for most of the boys. “We went duck hunting every chance we had. Back then it was food for the table. Since my grandfather ran the truck for the fish factory we were able to get permission to sink boxes in the meadows and hunt from them. Yes, we had decoys. Some of them were probably Horners, Shourdses, McAnnys – but I lost them all- some were stolen right out of the boat- but it is what it is,” said Heinrichs.

Hunting was so common that boys were able to take their guns to school and leave them in their lockers. “It was nothing to see a kid with a shotgun. One night after school, I shot two rabbits on Mrs. Richmond’s lawn on Cedar Street and she didn’t say anything. If you’d do that today—you’d get locked up.”

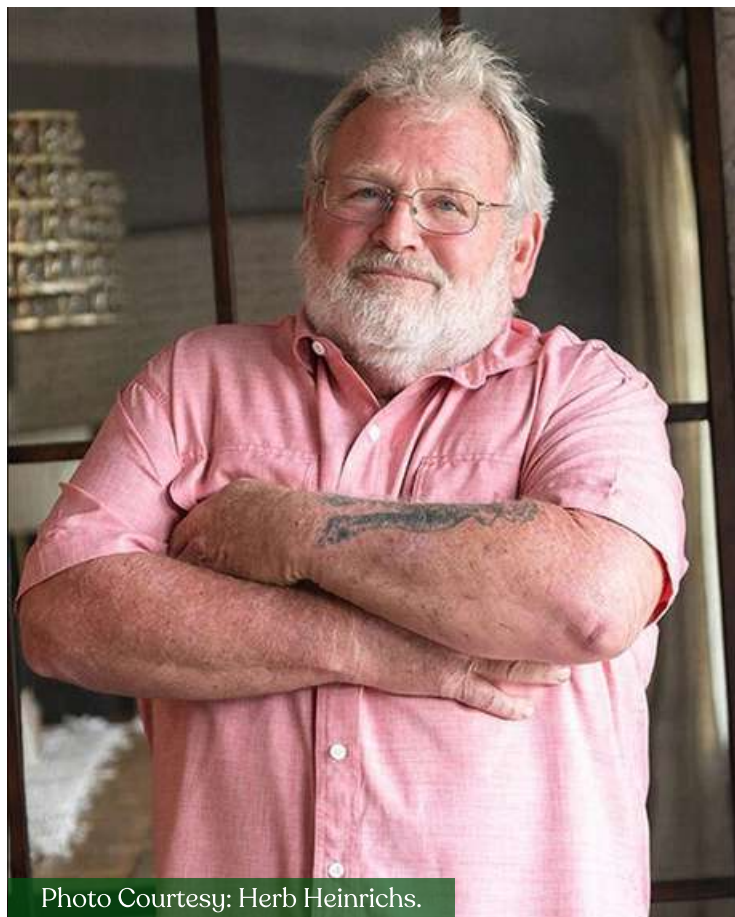

Like other boys in the area, Heinrichs went clamming in the bay. “My first boat was a 14’ sneakbox my father bought from Parkertown. I was ten or eleven. I went out with three buddies: Davy Miller, Johnny Godfry and Louie Driscoll. For our age we caught 200 or 300 a day tredding, later it was thousands. I clammed up until 1999. I had 19 acres of clam beds in the bay. I would plant the seed and 18 months later I would have small clams. I loved it. I wish I could still do it.”

Another pastime was garvey racing and Heinrichs had a T-101 souped-up garvey. “Me and Billy Mott had The Miss Town Tavern. Races were held every weekend in Tuckerton, West Creek, Barnegat or Pleasantville. I’ll tell you how it started: Pat and Joe Heinrichs, Eddie and George were coming back from clamming and decided to race their boats. It could have been others: Rocky Wycoff and some. And from there it took off—boats got bigger and fancier. This was in the early ‘60s.”

When racing, Heinrichs met Brenda, his wife of 56 years, in a tavern in North Jersey. “I had blown an engine in my boat and I took the engine out of her car and put it in my boat. That seemed like a proposal.”

Heinrichs started decoy carving in 1978 when he and Brenda moved to Louisiana. “That’s where I accepted Jesus, the most important thing in my life.” When visiting Tuckerton, “I saw Tommy Ryder carving decoys and that’s when I got serious. I thought I’d run with it. I started going to shows and selling stuff.”

When the couple moved back to Tuckerton ten years later, Heinrichs attended the decoy shows and taught decoy carving at Pinelands High School adult classes. “I loved doing that because when you are teaching, you are also teaching yourself.” He also judged decoy contests for many years, as did his son Keith.

Heinrichs was one of the founders of the Barnegat Bay Decoy and Baymen’s Museum (Tuckerton Seaport), serving as the President for the first year. “A handful of us were hanging out at Tips Hardware (in West Creek) and talking. We formed an association and it took off. It started as a way of doing something for kids. That was what was in my heart—to save Tuckerton’s heritage.”

The Museum was on Main Street at the entrance to Tip Seaman County Park. It was later moved across the street to the current site of the Tuckerton Seaport, and that original building now serves as the Hunting Shanty - a space for programs, community meetings, and exhibits.

The Museum was built with volunteer labor. “While we were building it I got sick and so I stepped down as president. I’m better now.”

While in Tuckerton, he took a few oil painting classes with local artist Joyce Lawrence. “I used to hate to draw but in 2016, I picked up a pencil. Then one Sunday in church, a guy I know said I should try pastel and I absolutely love it! This is all God’s work.”

Heinrichs now lives in Green Cove Springs on Florida’s East Coast surrounded by 50 acres of woods. “I love the woods. I have a sawmill and a workshop and I can make noise. But I love Tuckerton. My son lives in New Gretna and rebuilds boats. He has an oyster farm with 150 floating boxes. When we visit we stay in his houseboat.”

Heinrichs has won many awards for his decoys including Best in Show for a brant in the working decoy contest. Heinrichs was also the artist for the 2001 Decoy Show Print depicting Heinrichs Boatworks and the bird of the year, Ruddy Ducks. The Hurley Conklin Award for living the baymen’s way of life is richly deserved by Heinrichs who gives all the credit to his Savior.



Terry McNulty: 2026 Conklin Awardee

At age 85, Terry McNulty is still an avid duck hunter though this coming season he will have a friend with him rather than conquer the elements alone. McNulty has recently found a retriever that he is training and almost every day he takes his dog to Peck's Bay. He has two workshops in his Egg Harbor home—a carving shop in the garage where he also stores his duck boat and an office for painting his decorative and hunting decoys. His wife of 64 years, Peggy, has always been supportive of his work. "Every day I still go down to the river. When I come home for coffee, she asks, 'Well, is it still there?'"

McNulty was raised in Riverside, New Jersey and no one in his immediate family hunted or were outdoorsman, he said. But as a boy he was always outside, mucking about on the Delaware River and Rancocas Creek. He learned to hunt ducks with his boyhood friends. "When I was 15 I had to learn to hunt. My first gun was an Ithaca pump (shotgun) and I remember my first duck, a drake mallard and I stood there with my mouth open, watching it fall.

"I started carving because I needed a decoy rig. I gathered a bunch of old decoys and started fixing them up—painting them and repairing necks and bills. Eventually I went to the next level. I started carving cork

decoys in the 1960s—a half dozen at a time, mostly black ducks. By the 70s I figured it was time to go to wood. I carve hollow decoys in traditional Barnegat Bay and Delaware River styles, ones you can actually hunt over."

McNulty was one of the last Delaware River "scullers." He liked to scull close to the riverbank using his long-handled traditional scull oar and "push-poles" to literally push or propel the boat forward. And he never goes hunting in winter without his long-handled ice hook.

He no longer has the scull but he treasures his Barnegat Bay, feathered-edge sneakbox that is over 50 years old. "My parents took a picture of me when I was five or six years old standing on a sailing sneakbox on Long Beach Island. There must have been something in that boat that went all through my system."

The fact that he has hunted all his life has contributed to the lifelike quality of his carvings. McNulty has won numerous awards for his decoys starting with the Ward Foundation Show in Maryland, Ohio Decoy Carvers and Collectors Show, US Nationals Long Island Show and the Clayton, New Jersey Decoy show.

He entered his first show at the Ward Foundation in Salisbury, Maryland and won a third place in the decorative category. “I thought, ‘Wow but I can do better.’”

“Two years later I entered a hen mallard. Out of 15 in the tank I came in 7th and had my heart broken. I asked the judge—Paul Verdet what I might do better. He said I did a great job on the eyes and then he proceeded to ‘take an ax and chopped it up in little pieces.’ I thought I would never enter another contest until I know what I’m doing.”

“Then in 1976 I felt more comfortable and went to the U.S. Nationals on Long Island and won Best in Show for my pintail. That was the beginning when I started making decorative decoys and started competing. I went back to Maryland and won Best Puddle Duck in Decorative. And in 1985 I won Best in World Hunting Decoy. I got more and more involved in decorative but I get more enjoyment making hunting decoys. A fancy bird is nice but it just sits on a shelf.”

For years he entered in shows all over the country—and won Best in Show in north and south California, in Clayton, New York and the Ward Foundation among others.

“My tendency is to try and recreate a real duck. That’s what I love and I’m told to do what you love.”

When he hunted in Brigantine, he used to sell his decoys right out of his boat to other hunters.

He started teaching others to carve from a shop in his trucking company in Riverside. “Two fellows got really good- Caleb Mater and Horace Jennings,” said McNulty.

McNulty also volunteered at the Tuckerton Seaport and did carving demonstrations in the Jay Parker carving shop. He enjoyed demonstrating for the public and one year he carved a life-size swan that kept folks coming back to watch his progress.

McNulty declared, “I love everything about duck hunting, the decoys, the boats, the guns.. I hunt over hand-carved decoys and I collect some. I put them on a shelf and on days I can’t get out, I sit in my lounge chair and pick a decoy or two and think about that duck bouncing on the bay or river.”

Joe Smith and Stanley H. “Bud” Seaman

2026 Hall of Fame Awardees

This is the third year for the Michael T. Mangum Hall of Fame Award, given to the people who contributed to the creation and success of the Old Time Barnegat Bay Decoy and Gunning Show. This year’s awards are being given posthumously to Stanley “Bud” Seaman and Joe Smith.

Joe Smith was the Park Manager of Tip Seaman County Park from when it was Tuckerton Lake County Park before the County named it after Bud Seaman’s Father, Stanley H. “Tip” Seaman. Mangum remembers the early days of the Decoy and Gunning Show, “The New Jersey Decoy Collectors Association predated the Decoy show; they approached Smith and Mangum with the idea of having a tailgate picnic and decoy swap, sale and buy affair at the park. After discussion, probably at Tips Hardware, it was decided to make it a decoy and gunning show.

Bud Seaman was the proprietor of Tips Hardware in West Creek along with and after his father Tip passed away. The hardware store was the unofficial meeting place for area baymen and local residents said Mike Mangum, retired director of the Ocean County Parks and Recreation Department and local resident. “It was an old school hardware store with everything you needed for

going out in the bay—boat hardware and paint and clam rakes. If he didn’t have it, he was famous for saying, ‘I’ll have it for you Tuesday,’ but he never said which Tuesday! That was a running joke.” Ocean County Commissioner and former longtime Little Egg Harbor Republican committee member Ray Gormley, was brought up in Parkertown, just down the road from Tips Hardware in West Creek. While he didn’t know Joe Smith, Commissioner Gormley has fond memories of Stanley “Bud” Seaman and of his father Stanley “Tip” Seaman. Tip Seaman and Commissioner Gormley’s father, James “Jim” Gormley, were good friends and worked together for the benefit of Little Egg Harbor, said Commissioner Gormley. His father Jim was a Little Egg Harbor Committeeman for many years while Tip Seaman was an Ocean County Freeholder.

Commissioner Gormley’s first memories of Bud and Tip were visiting the hardware store in summer, where every kid would get a free soda. “They had one of those old-fashioned Coke machines with the glass bottles. It was great. I always looked forward to it.” The store was a gathering place for locals—coffee and donuts for the

grownups. “I don’t think they made much money, I think they just liked to be around people,” said Gormley. “They were both kind-hearted, very special people.”

“Buddy had a great collection of decoys—some of the best, early decoys. That’s how he knew so many folks to invite to the show (Old Time Barnegat Bay Decoy and Gunning Show). And here’s something not many people know, Buddy’s second passion was he had a semi-pro softball team—Tips Hardware Softball. They played around the state and parts of the country. I played on the secondary team—Bert Beebe’s Kids. We were the younger guys and Bud would pitch for us! He loved to pitch.”

“Both Bud and Joe were instrumental in getting the show together,” said Mangum. “Through his connections, Bud knew the names of collectors and vendors important to the show. He was also always making up show hats and shirts and giving them to the show and he would donate prizes for the contests.”

You might say he was the heart and soul of the show.”

“Joe Smith was great with getting things done. The first year we had great weather for the show but year two we had a nor’easter. The Tuckerton Library Association wanted to set up in the park and Joe knew the retired general of the (New Jersey) National Guard and he was allowed to get a tent from the armory that used to be on Route 9. Well, we go to get it and it’s a World War Two vintage tent. We were setting that thing up in the pouring rain and wind.” Joe also promoted the show all over the state, said Mangum, putting posters in rest areas on the parkway and in sporting goods stores.

“I’m glad Bud Seaman is getting the award,” said Commissioner Gormley, “If you didn’t know him, you missed a great person.” Mangum emphasized the statement, adding Bud Seaman and Joe Smith really made the Old Time Barnegat Bay Decoy & Gunning Show what it was in those early years.
